The last Edmonton Homeless Count recorded 2,174 homeless citizens. Many front line workers believe this number is low.

According to the 2012 Homeless Count:

- Aboriginal people made up 46% of Edmonton's homeless community, a number that has been increasing since 1999. Edmonton is on Treaty Six land.
- Edmonton's female and Aboriginal populations are, on average, younger than other groups
- Children and underage youth made up 13% of homeless people counted
- The number of sheltered homeless Edmontonians is rising
